

SB Theatre Department **Revives a Morality Play**

An updated medieval morality play, "Castle of Perseverance," is scheduled as the first Fall production of the Theatre Arts Department.

Theatre Arts Professor Tom Neumiller, director of the play, has incorporated mime, dialogue, narrative, and innovative staging to give this centuries-old story a contemporary flavor. Written in 1485, "Castle of Perseverance," was one of the first of the morality plays, allegorical dramas concerned with a religious theme. The play traces a man going through his life, teetering between vice and virtue. Each of the 24 characters in the Brook production Stony symbolizes an abstraction; roles include Mankind, God, Satan, the World, and each of the virtues and vices. Original staging, designed by Prof. Neumiller, complements the medieval origins of the play. The action takes place on several platforms spread throughout the audience as well as in the center of this theatre-in-the-round production.

Performances are scheduled for Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, October 11, 12, and 13 and for Tuesday through Saturday, October 15, thru 19. All performances begin at 8:30 p.m. at the University's

Local chapter president of the Civil Service Employes Association Al Varacchi, Acting University President T. Alexander Pond and Acting Polity President Mark Avery are spearheading the effort, which will include the establishment of depots for contributions of food,

medicine and clothing in the Stony Brook Union, the Administration building and at South Campus.

Early Support

The campaign has already won support from several quarters. Vice President for Finance and Management Joseph Diana is cooperating in the production of a bulk mailing appeal to 10,000 faculty and students. And the Perkins Trucking firm of Central

Islip has agreed to transport donated articles to a dock in New York City, where they will be shipped to the disaster area.

The hurricane has killed an estimated 8,000 persons, left 10,000 persons homeless and has destroyed a substantial portion of the Central American Republic's crop harvest.

Sanger Lot to Be Repaved

The Sanger College parking lot will be closed to all vehicles at midnight, Sunday, October 13. This is the gravel-covered lot behind Sanger College in Tabler Quad.

By the same hour and date, all cars should be removed from the Roth Quad area spaces along the east side of the service road which leads behind Roth Quad to the Lecture Center. Contractors will be completing the curb and blacktop work along the east side of the road. These spaces are located across the Whitman and Gershwin parking lots at Roth.

The Department of Public Safety has advised the campus that all cars found in the Sanger College lot and in the Roth spaces along the east side of the road to the Lecture Center will be towed away after midnight, Sunday, October 13.

We urge all drivers to use as alternative parking the newly-repaved main Tabler parking lot adjacent to the entrance to Tabler Quad, seventy-five percent was reopened this week, providing space for several hundred automobiles.

Appeals Extended

If you were issued a parking or traffic ticket between the dates August 26 through September 30, your period of appeal of that ticket has been extended by the SB administration to Friday, October 18.
