

UC Berkeley Chancellor to Speak Here November 3

r. Chang-Lin Tien, chancellor of the University of California, Berkeley, will speak at Stony Brook on "The Role of Asian Americans in American Higher Education" on Thursday, November 3.

Dr. Tien's views on the subject and on related issues were featured in an article in last week's edition of *Newsweek* magazine.

A Martin Berlin professor of mechanical engineering, Dr. Tien came to the United States 38 years ago and has made major contributions to America's space technology, nuclear reactor safety and energy technology. But, he writes in *Newsweek*, "No matter the scope of my accomplishments, when many Americans see my face and hear my Chinese accent, they think of me as an immigrant, first and foremost. In the eyes of many, that has come to mean a drain on public services, a competitor for jobs and a threat to a cohesive society." Dr. Tien is expected to address this issue and more in his 7:30 p.m. address in the Alliance Room, Melville Library.

His talk, which is free and open to the public, is co-sponsored by the Chinese Studies Program, the Social Science Interdisciplinary Program and the Chinese Association of Stony Brook.



Multimedia Introduction to Japanese Music Practical Advice from Writer's Digest Editor Something to Dance About Seeking Justice' Show Comes to Union Art Gallery

Composer, professor and music educator Kohichi Hattori will present "36,000 Days of Japanese Music," on Thursday, November 10, at 8 p.m. in the Staller Center for the Arts Recital Hall. Sponsored by the Office of the Provost, this Distinguished Lecture is free and open to campus and community.

Mr. Hattori, professor at the Tokyo Kasei University, has presented his mixed media lecture/concert around the United States and Canada as well as in Latin America and Europe, to introduce Japanese culture and music to Western audiences. At Stony Brook, he will be accompanied by Kimiko Fukunari, one of Japan's leading operatic sopranos.

In Japan, Mr. Hattori is well known as an arts and education commentator on television and radio. He has conducted Japanese music with various symphonies both in Japan and abroad. His musical compositions include several published in the U.S. by Boosey & Hawkes (New York) and Southern Music Company (San Antonio), and he is author of several books on music. His major awards include the Record Grand Prix, two Japanese Art Festival Awards of Merit and an Asia Foundation Grant.

The presentation will include video segments, slides, taped and live performances. The program ranges widely, touching on Japanese rock, European folk songs performed in Japanese, contemporary Japanese art songs, and Concerto for Erhu (a traditional Japanese stringed instrument) by Mr. Hattori.

A new series of Cultural Arts Evenings at the University will debut on Friday, November 11, at 7:30 p.m., when Writer's Digest editor Peter Blocksom presents a guest lecture on "Seven Reasons (and Ways) to Publish." His talk is designed for both published and unpublished writers. A reception will follow the lecture. The event is free and open to the public.

Cultural Arts Evenings will be held in Room S-102 of Social and Behavioral Sciences, adjacent to the garage, where parking is free on weekends.

This will be the first in a series of events sponsored by the School of Continuing Education, with assistance from the Department of Auxiliary Services.

UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CENTER APPOINTS **RON MANNING TO HEAD ISLAND-WIDE HEALTH INITIATIVE FOR UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES**

The University Medical Center at Stony Brook announced the appoint ment of Ronald C. Manning of Coram, as Director of the Long Island-wide Health Initiative for Underserved Communities.

The Health Initiative, started by Stony Brook in January of this year, has reached directly into many of Long Island's underserved communities, delivering much-needed health care services and identifying community leaders to articulate the needs of their communities.

"Ron Manning's leadership in health care particularly in bringing healthcare to some of Long Island's neediest families-is an enormous asset to the people of Long Island," says University Hospital's Director and CEO, Dr. Michael Maffetone. "We are strengthening a program which has already touched hundreds of lives since its inception in January."



Manning, who holds a law degree (J.D.) and a M.S. in Human Resource Development and Adult Education, has clerked for NYS Supreme Court Justice Peter F. Cohalan and was appointed by the Governor to the Board of Visi-

tors of Kings Park Psychiatric Center. Long active in community affairs as President of the Longwood Central School Board, and a member of the Boards of the American Heart Association, the Long Island Head Start Child Development Services, Inc., and the NAACP, Manning has served the people of Suffolk County since 1981 as an administrator at the Coram Health Center. In that capacity, he's planned and implemented primary health service and community outreach programs in the areas of HIV counseling and testing, prostate screening, lead screening, mammography, tuberculosis control, women and childrens' health services, and immunology.

Since January, the University Medical Center's Health Initiative for Underserved Communities has given more than 1,000 men free prostate screenings-a test of particular importance to African American men who suffer from a rate of prostate cancer twice that of the non-African American population. The Medical Center and the American Cancer Society conducted a bilingual, low-cost mammography campaign, reaching more than 150 women. And in the area of children and family services, the University Medical Center signed an agreement with Just Kids Diagnostic and Treatment Center of Middle Island, and held a state sponsored "Decade of the Child Town Meeting" attended by more than 1,000 Long Islanders and representatives of 24 state agencies.

"With Ron Manning directing Stony Brook's Health Initiative, the message to the underserved population of Long Island is clear," said Dr. Maffetone. "That message is: We at the University Medical Center care about all the people of Long Island and we are committed to bringing them the highest quality health care."

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
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
