Alumni Organizing Travel Program

The Alumni Association is starting a travel program. There may be trips this summer or fall to Europe, Mexico or the Caribbean.

At Easter-time, 1974, the Association will be sponsoring a 10-day trip to Moscow and Leningrad with a brief look at Helsinki. All Stony Brook alumni will be eligible for the trip, via a big chartered Finnair DC-8, at a truly unprecedented price.

The price won't definitely be set for some time yet, but it will include round-trip iet tickets, hotel accommodations, special tours, transfers, taxes, tips, service charges and some meals. When we're able to announce the price, you'll be very pleasantly surprised. For openers, we know it won't be \$500, not even \$400, maybe not even....but more on costs when we're sure.

'61-'68 Alumni **Subject of Study**

A study of alumni from the classes of '61 through '68 was made by the career development office in 1969. Since more than 1000 of the 1761 alumni in those classes responded to the questionnaires, the results may be of interest, in spite of their outdatedness.

The tabulation showed that 42% were married and the average salary was \$8,154. The men on the average were earning \$303 more per year than the women.

About 32% of alumni reported that they had attended graduate school full-time, 29% part-time. Graduate work was done at 165 different universities in this country, as well as 11 schools overseas.

About 36% of the returns indicated alumni had been involved in full-time teaching (47% of the female returns), 4% part-time. Some 14% of the men had served in the military service and 11 graduates had been in the Peace Corps.



Payroll Director Vincent Ruggi Remembers When

The student dormitories were remodeled stables and, on occasion, administrators had to abandon their desks to help unload a delivery truck. And yet the faculty and staff who have been with the University long enough to remember the temporary campus in Oyster Bay where these conditions existed speak fondly of the experience.

The University's current director of payrolls, Vincent Ruggi, joined the Oyster Bay campus as principal account clerk in 1958, soon after it was established. "Sure there were inconveniences," he said. "But the beauty of the grounds and the feeling of camaraderie among the faculty and staff made those early days rewarding for

The Oyster Bay campus which was used by the University until 1963 was located on the former Coe estate, a 400-acre tract of flowering trees and shrubs with a 60room English Tudor mansion, a large greenhouse and several auxiliary buildings. side or at a chamber concert organized by Isaac Nemiroff," Mr. Ruggi said.

The students in those early days were less independent than the students of today, according to Mr. Ruggi. "It's a national trend," he said. "At that time, the students were concerned with curfew; today they are involved in many of the major decisions of the University.'

The biggest Oyster Bay squabble was generated by the faculty, Mr. Ruggi said. "A segment of the faculty believed that the academic disciplines should be grouped in a general way into divisions as was the case at the University of Chicago," he said. "They were opposed by another group which thought that each discipline should be represented by a separate academic department."

Before coming to the Oyster Bay campus, Mr. Ruggi had been with three other campuses of the State University of New York. He first joined the system in 1949, a year after it was established, at the State University Institute of Applied Arts and Sciences, now Brooklyn Community College. He also worked at Downstate Medical Center and the State Agricultural and Technical College at Farmingdale.

A 1940 graduate of St. John's University, Mr. Ruggi entered the U.S. Army in 1944 after working as a supervisor in a defense plant. He is still active in the army reserve holding the rank of chief warrant officer. He belongs to an intelligence unit at Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn.

Mr. Ruggi was one of the founders of the Stony Brook Chapter of the Civil Service Employees Association (CSEA) in 1960. He currently serves as delegate from the local chapter to state-wide USEA meetings in Albany.

Health Lab Named For Alumnus

A health sciences laboratory at Stony Brook has been dedicated to a former student, Emmanuel A. Makros.

The Makros Lab honors a man who died in August 1971 after a seven-year battle with Hodgkins disease. A respiratory therapist, he was a member of the first class to graduate from the School of Allied Health Professions with a B.S. degree in cardiopulmonary technology and respiratory therapy.

In a dedication ceremony, the cardiopulmonary and respiratory therapy lab was named in recognition of his "high level of intelligence, courage, leadership and concern for others."

News from the Campus

• THE ARTS: Even as excavation for the • CONTINUING EDUCATION: This long-awaited Fine Arts Building got underway Stony Brook faculty were attracting national attention with their achievements in the arts, underlining the need for a permanent center for the fine arts on campus. The first phase of the building is being constructed under a \$7.6 million contract and is expected to be completed by late 1974 or early 1975. Approval for the second phase of the building, which includes theatre and concert facilities, is being sought from the legislature this year.

Dr. Sarah Fuller, who is serving as acting chairman of the music department, received the Alfred Einstein award for the best research article in music published in 1972. The award, named for the cousin of the famous physicist, is presented annually by the American Musicological Society. Prof. Isaac Nemiroff, one of several composers on the music department faculty, won an ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers) award for the seventh consecutive year. Prof. Charles Rosen, a musicologist and performing artist, who last year won a National Book Award and whose concerts have received critical acclaim, has been named a Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar for 1973.

• THE MOON: In the history of celestial bodies as in the life of man, the two most important dates are birth and death. For the past several years, Stony Brook scientists in the earth and space sciences department under Dr. Oliver Schaeffer have been seeking the date for the birth of the moon, analyzing the oldest lunar rocks brought to earth by Apollo astronauts. In January a tremor of excitement ran through the scientific community when Dr. Schaeffer and his colleagues announced that the orange soil brought back from the moon in December, and which some scientists thought would be only 10 million years old, was more than 3 billion years old. This indicates, Dr. Schaeffer said, that the moon has been geologically dead for more than 3 billion years.

• PHYSICIST PRAISED: Some 800 scientists' attending the biennial meeting of the International Conference on High Energy Physics in Batavia, Illinois, heard praise for the work of Stony Brook's Dr. Benjamin Lee. His research on the development of models which synthesize electromagnetic and weak interactions along with similar work by scientists at M.I.T. was described as "the greatest recent advance" in theoretical physics.

semester the Center for Continuing Education (CED) is offering a wide variety of options through classes and the University Lecture Series, including an introduction to physics by Nobel Laureate C. N. Yang, perspectives on the development of biological concepts by Distinguished Professor of Biology Bentley Glass, and an historical survey of art by Prof. Jacques Guilmain, chairman of the art department.

Some 750 Long Island dentists are expected to participate in a continuing education program being sponsored by the School of Dental Medicine in cooperation with Long Island Dental Societies and several hospitals Working nurses wishing to supplement their R.N. certification with the B.S. degree can now do so through a new option designed by the School of Nursing specifically for working nurses who cannot afford to leave their employment to complete their undergraduate education.

Graduate education has been made more accessible for some 30 employees of the Grumman Aerospace Corporation and a few others enrolled in a new program offered by Stony Brook's department of applied mathematics. Classes are offered at the Grumman headquarters in Bethpage. and students can earn an M.S. in the parttime, evening program.

FROM PEKING, TO MOSCOW: Seven leading scientists from the People's Republic of China spent part of the Thanksgiving weekend at Stony Brook while touring U.S. educational and scientific facilities as part of an exchange program following President Nixon's visit to Peking last year. Stony Brook was the first of 11 ma universities to be visited by the delegation.

Travel was also part of the plans of Stony Brook scientists. Chemistry Prof. Albert Haim went to Cheshire, England, in December where he was the only non-British scientist to speak at the annual meeting of the British Chemical Society. University President John S. Toll visited Moscow in January where he chaired a session of the International Conference on Mathematical Problems of Quantum Field Theory and Quantum Statistics as a guest of the Soviet Academy of Sciences. Prof. Leif Sjoberg of the Germanic and Slavic Languages Department had only a short trip to make to the Swedish Consulate in New York City to receive the knighthood bestowed on him by King Gustav for his 'services to Sweden and Swedish-American relations."

Wins Fellowship

Sheila Kassoy '72 is one of only 30 U.S. students chosen to receive International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation Fellowships.

The awards are designed to promote international cooperation by sponsoring a year of study abroad for 30 American students during the 1973-74 academic year and one year of study in the U.S. for 30 students from foreign countries.

Miss Kassoy earned a B.A. degree in Russian and is planning to study the folklore and native songs and dances of Yugoslavia. She hopes to leave in June for the University of Skoplue in Macedonia, Yugoslavia, in time for the annual summer festivals of song and dance there.

Dies in Africa

Sheila Guinn '70 was killed in an auto accident Feb. 26 in Ghana, Africa. A third year student at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, she was attending the University of Ghana Medical College as part of a special six-week program.


