## Alumni Off to See the World: London, Malaga and Moscow




London

Trips to London and Spain (Malaga, Torremolinos, the Costa del Sol) are set for this summer as the Alumni Association's new travel program gets off to a

Brochures on the two trips were mailed to alumni early this summer. (If you haven't received them, contact the Alumni Office.)

The London trip is scheduled July 10-18 from New York at an all-inclusive price of \$249 per person plus 15% tax and service. The price covers round-trip jet flight, in-flight meals and beverages, twin-bedded room with private bath, continental breakfast daily, round trip transfers, baggage handling, tips and taxes on these services, a half-day sightseeing tour and airport taxes. For those who prefer to make their own land accommodations, air fare tickets only are available at \$169 plus \$3 tax.

The trip to Spain, from New York to Malaga, is scheduled August 15-23. The trip's all-inclusive price is \$245 per person plus 15% tax and service. The price covers arrangements similar to those for the London trip but including dinner as well as breakfast daily. There's no sightseeing tour as on the London trip but there is a "Welcome Sangria Cocktail Party" included. Accommodations are at the

Hotel Al Andaluz in Torremolinos. Air only tickets also are available for the Spanish trip, at \$179 plus \$3 tax and

Both the London and Spanish trips are considered unusually good travel values, particularly for the peak summer travel season. Individual alumni may also make group travel arrangements for trips other than these two official alumni offerings this summer through the Association's back-up travel agency. ## **Alumni Buying Service Has Bargains**

The Alumni Buying Service, which enables alumni to purchase a variety of appliances, automobiles and even a complete physical examination at big discount prices, so far has been used by only a couple dozen members, Treasurer John Bockino '68 reports. However, word is spreading from these satisfied customers and sales are expected to increase during the summer

The Association gets a pro-rated financial return when members use the service and the members have the chance to buy what they need at less than discount prices, Mr. Bockino says. The result: everybody benefits.

Savings on a color TV range from \$50 to \$150 depending on the make and model and \$35-\$75.on a washing machine or refrigerator. Similar savings are offered on dishwashers, carpeting, stereos and a host of other major appliances.

Any make or model automobile can be purchased through the service at savings of up to \$400. Dealer mark-ups vary with the time of the year. Cars are cheapest when the dealers are trying to get rid of

their stock before the new models are delivered. But with alumni buying power, you can get a better than end-of-season buy now. If you were to buy a new car now through the service you would save about \$300 or more.

## **Ann Hussey Loves Working With Young**

After many years of successful volunteer and social work with children and young adults, Ann Hussey came to Stony Brook in 1962 convinced that working with young people was the only kind of work she wanted to do.

Happily married and with five children of her own, she wanted a job that would give her the chance to work with and for students, and her staff spot in the Dean of Students office gave her just that. She quickly began helping Stony Brook's first classes start the student activities and set the young traditions that were meant to make the new campus home.

In 1967, when the student government went independent and became Polity, Ann Hussey was the natural choice to become Director of Student Activities, a post which has continually placed her at the nerve center of all student action on campus. She's accomplished a great deal with every class she's worked with, but she is probably best remembered for her own particular style of instant rapport. Small, attractive, impeccably groomed, always buoyant, she has a way of cutting right to an issue with anyone, young or old, disarming them and charming them with courtesy, and getting her point across clearly.

Her close association with students is explained by her chief responsibility: she holds Polity's pursestrings, a fact that keeps her very visible and very on the line. "I disperse all activity monies, sign all checks, make sure each group doesn't go over its allotted budget for the year," she says. "With that kind of power, there are bound to be disagreements, and the students and I have had them. But, essentially, we've always been able to get along. I think they really know I have genuine concern for them, that I want to help them with their problems, that I see another side to them that others may not see, that I want their communication. They can come into my office anytime to talk, confide, even explode. In return, I want the respect that they know I give

Polity's annual budget is over one-half million dollars, and Mrs. Hussey is very proud of the fact that such a large-scale operation is running "very much in the black." What she always hopes for each

year is a good student government. With it, she feels, the students can get the optimum out of the money allotted to them, something she wants for every class.

But it's the students themselves who command most of her memories. She admits they are unforgettable, and warmly recalls their individuality, their talents, their needs. "I remember them all with great affection," she says, "even the ones I argued with most. I like a person who stands behind what he believes."

Often, she wonders how she herself is remembered. "I've always told them that there is a way of doing everything in this world, and you have to learn the

right way. I'm sure they get sick of hearing me say that all the time, but that's something of me that I hope sticks in their minds. I want to see them all do their own things, stand on their own two feet, reach their own goals, but I want to see them do it right, and maybe I try to guide them a little too strongly with that philosophy.'

"Maybe the most I can hope for is that they remember me as a person who really cared, who really wanted the best for

Most Stony Brook people who ever worked with her probably already do.

#### SF Foundation Helps Alumni Ass'n

Professional management and investment counseling for the Alumni Association's funds became a reality a few weeks ago as Association President Joseph Van Denburg '69, signed an agreement with Carl Hanes, Foundation Treasurer, and John F. Burness, Foundation Secretary. Through the agreement, five Foundation accounts were opened for the Alumni Association's scholarship programs and for general Alumni operating funds. The Foundation, headquartered on campus, is

a funding agency that seeks to develop University programs in the various critical areas where state funds are not available. Its Investment Committee, including senior members of the Long Island banking community, will seek the highest interest returns available for the alumni scholarship funds. The agreement was undertaken in recognition of the mutual interest shared by the Foundation and the Alumni Association in aiding development of the campus.

#### **Couey Scholarship Fund Started**

The Alumni Association's Elizabeth Couey The Class of 1966 already has begun a Scholarship Fund was formally established early this month with a gift of \$750 from the Class of 1966.

Mrs. Couey, who died in 1971 at the age of 66, was a guidance and student activities counsellor who had been a member of the University's staff since 1962.

The Couey Scholarship fund has been established as a separate account in the Stony Brook Foundation as part of the Alumni Association's recent financial merger with the Foundation. A few other initial gifts in addition to the '66 gift bring total funds now in the account to about \$1000. This money already is earning a high interest return through investments by the Stony Brook Foundation. However, at least several thousand dollars in additional funds must be secured before any scholarships can be awarded without invading principal.

"Mrs. Elizabeth Couey, while acting as the coordinator of student activities, managed to enter many of our lives. Always she spoke an encouraging word and readily lent a helping hand. She clearly demonstrated that age has no bounds on life. . . . I would like to urge everyone in our class who can do so to send a tax-deductible gift so the Couey Scholarship Fund can become a permanent memorial to Mrs. Couey."

### Memorial Fund Honors Guinn '70

A memorial scholarship fund is being established at Albert Einstein College of Medicine in honor of a black student, Sheila Guinn, 70, who was killed in a February auto accident in Ghana, Africa. After graduating from Stony Brook, she entered Einstein College as a medical student and was on a special six-week elective program at the University of Ghana Medical College when she was killed.

The minority affairs committee of Einstein's Faculty Student Senate writes: "Sheila was a person who radiated life and love for the world in which she lived. The combination of her bright personality and golden smile made her a refreshing oasis in the desert of our daily academic routine. Her scholarly attitude was a source of inspiration to youngsters she worked with who look forward to entering medical school in the future. Her fresh and innovative thoughts, and her boundless energy, made it seem as if she had indeed a limitless source of inner energy. . . It is impossible to find a substitute for the potential benefits Sheila could have brought to human life if she were alive today."

# Ranc '71 Practices What He Preaches: Esperanto

Richard Ranc '71 is a dedicated Esperantist.

When he was 16 and confined to bed with pneumonia, he taught himself the international language, Esperanto, in two weeks. The simplified language was created to foster greater communication between peoples of all countries, he explained. Its simplicity rests on streamlined grammar with no exceptions to the rules and Latin origins for the vocabulary.

Ranc has helped organize an Esperanto Club at Southern Illinois University where he is completing a Ph.D. program in psychology.

He enjoys traveling and, because there are 13 million Esperanto enthusiasts in the world, he finds the language very useful. He finds local Esperantists by contacting Esperanto Clubs in major cities and by using the Esperanto Year Book which lists local representatives. "Esperantists are always willing to take you home and entertain. It brings people together on neutral linguistic ground," he said.

#### Twins Seek to Learn Whether Look-Alikes Act Alike



A pair of 25-year-old identical twins, Harold and Steven Weisman, both members of the class of '69, are conducting tests to discover whether look-alikes act alike.

One Saturday in December, 49 sets of twins, ages 2-14, furnished by the Greater Northeast Philadelphia Mothers of Twins, gathered to be tested, one twin against the other, in a series of perceptual-motor development tests.

The object was to discover whether twins perceive things in the same way, and, if so, is this a result of genetic or environmental factors? The Weismans, interns at Philadelphia College of Optometry, write: "The results implied that the identical twins performed in a highly similar manner, the fraternal twins were sometimes similar to each other in their scores, but were not significantly better than may be expected from the general population in perceptual-motor tasks."
