News of the Milky Way

Stony Brook professor of astronomy Philip M. Solomon recently reported the results of a three-year National Science Foundation-supported study of the milky way that showed that 5,000 enormous, interstellar, star-forming clouds, 200 light-years in size, are the most massive objects in the milky way. "Each cloud contains as much matter as a half million suns," according to Professor Solomon.

Working with antennae in Tucson, Arizona and at the University of Massachusetts, Professor Solomon helped determine that the clouds must be about 100 million years old. The new findings show that these clouds are ten to one hundred times more massive than previously supposed, and that "our galaxy is still a very active system," said Professor Solomon.

An Alumnus' Desire

Richard Rand ('75) was an alumnus with a dream. As a graduate of Stony Brook's theatre program he worked and performed with theatre companies from Boston to San Francisco. But he never forgot his colleagues on campus and he hoped, one day, to work with them again. In August the dream came true.

A Cowboy's Desire is an original play, conceived and directed by Richard and shown to standing-room-only audiences in the South Campus Theatre on August 2-5. The play, presented by the Well Diggers Experimental Theatre Company with the sponsorship and help of the Stony Brook Foundation and Alumni Association, is a tragic-comic fable derived from the writings and lyrics of Long Island artists. It traces the myth of the lonely cowboy, the rise of a rock star from the academic to the legitimate stage.

Richard played the lead role and was supported by Stony Brook alumni Dorothy Cantwell ('75), Robert Epstein ('75), William Lambert and Robin Roose. Musical accompaniment was supplied by Judy Lipshutz ('76) and Judy Hochberg. The players plan to "take the show on the road."



Stony Brook People Profile: Laura Schlessinger ('68)

College professor, counsellor, public speaker, columnist, radio talk show host, scientist. Laura Schlessinger is a versatile and talented person with a extensive and wide-ranging background.

Upon completion of her B.S. in Biology at Stony Brook, Laura studied in the physiology department of Columbia University, where she received her Masters and Ph.D. Since 1975, she has been a professor of biological science at the University of Southern California, teaching physiology and human sexuality. She is also a certified sex educator at the USC Medical School as well as a marriage, family and child counselling intern at the USC Human Relations Center.

Laura is best known, however, for her nationally syndicated counselling column *Closer Encounters*, and for a two-hour call-in talk show she hosts every Sunday night on KWIZ AM/FM, Santa Ana. She is also a frequent television guest host on a Mental Health Sessions program seen in California.

Asked in a recent extensive L.A. Times Magazine interview what was the most common topic she dealt with in her work, Dr. Laura (as she is known to her listeners, though she eschews the *Dear Abby* image) replied, "It isn't sex, but unhappiness. People...have a lack of a sense of belonging. Some talk about very sad things...share their feelings...the deep dark, ugly pain that is in all of us. Pain comes from misunderstanding, misinformation, fear and defensiveness. These things interfere with loving in both the physical and emotional sense." Laura says she is very sensitive to pain, "because I deal with it a lot." She thinks the most important thing she does is care.

Sexuality, as Laura discusses it, "is a subject that has a lot to do with our identity in the world. In therapy, we examine why we choose certain occupations, cling to certain self-images, have positive or negative feelings about other people. In effect, the program is not designed to appeal to some freaky person on the edge, but to explore the many connotations of gender." Most of Laura's callers range from 18 to 25 years of age, with 30 calls a night for a "heavy" topic, 60 if it's fun. "Now and then I get someone older, like the 72-year-old man who said he was horny. I told him there were thousands of women who would love to meet him."

Involvement is the trademark of Laura's approach to counselling, role-playing and therapy referral are important tools in her trade. "It's a good feeling to know you've been in the midst of somebody's life and have helped them," she said recently. "There has to be a human touch. You can't be strictly academic and clinical. If you are, you may impress the person, but you won't help him."

Laura's personal life is also non-academic. She makes time in her busy routine for tennis sessions, bicycle riding, jogging, disco dancing and long walks. "I have to keep physically fit," she says, "because it takes a lot of strength to face the constant challenge of dealing with people's problems." Laura also reports that she enjoys being single. She says that a long-range personal goal is looking for the biological origins of mental illness. But right now she gets the most pleasure from doing what many Stony Brook People find themselves doing: helping other people. For Laura Schlessinger it has turned into a gratifying and successful career.

Books and periodicals printed at the turn of the century by the Roycroft Press of East Aurora, NY were presented to the University by Tom Drysdale ('70). The gift was made possible by the Stony Brook Foundation. Drysdale is a member of the film and television faculty at NYU.

The Roycroft Press was established in 1895 by Elbert Hubbard, an American printer who was influenced by British printer William Morris and the concept of books as art objects. Hubbard founded a Utopian community which was dedicated to the preservation of handcraftsmanship in metalworking and furniture design as well as bookbinding and illuminated texts. The gift becomes part of the Melville Library's Department of Special Collections.
