

HOSPITAL READY

Stony Brook's long-awaited University Hospital is scheduled to open in early spring, the only University-owned and operated teaching hospital on Long Island. The hospital is the latest addition to the Health Sciences Center, a modern interconnected complex which also includes a Clinical Sciences Tower and a Basic Health Research Building. The combined interior floor space of these three buildings exceeds that of the Empire State Building. Preliminary authority has also been granted for construction of a new Dental School facility.

The HSC, which offers teaching, research, and health care, consists of six schools — Allied Health Professions, Basic Health Sciences, Dental Medicine, Medicine, Nursing, and Social Welfare. The teaching hospital alone will house 140 departments serving 540 beds. Two hundred full-time faculty physicians, 600 staff physicians, 275 residents, and several hundred nurses and other professionals will be employed by the hospital. One thousand patients per day are expected to use the ambulatory and emergency care services; about 100 beds are designed

for intensive care, 125 for specialty care. A heliport will be available to receive critical cases for emergency treatment.

Ultimately, the hospital's ambulatory services will evolve into about 80 clinics delivering health care in a private practice format. Facilities will provide for open heart surgery, severe burn treatment, high-risk obstetrics, neonatal and pediatric intensive care, renal dialysis, organ transplantation, and acute psychiatric services for adults and children. A formal hospital dedication ceremony is scheduled for late spring.



● On January 4, SUNY Chancellor Clifton R. Wharton announced Gov. Carey's nomination of the first three SUNY alumni to the State University Board of Trustees. Wharton cited the "need to bring the alumni experience to the SUNY Board."

● Five Stony Brook professors were awarded \$600,000 by the American Cancer Society for research on anti-tumor drugs, viruses and cells.

● A Marine Sciences Research Center professor and three graduate students left in December on a 275-foot vessel for a month-long voyage bound for Cook Strait, Southwest Pacific. They will participate in an international oceanographic study of a number of sites on the continental shelf of New Zealand, focusing on the "controlling influences of ocean circulation and mixing dynamics on the biological productivity of shallow seas." Skylab photos of one site east of New Zealand showed unexplained photoplankton blooms streaking out from the strait, hundreds of miles to sea.

● The Long Island Hall of Fame Sculpture Series is housed in the courtyards of the Health Services Center. The modern sculptures honor fourteen distinguished Long Islanders.

● Amiri Baraka (LeRoi Jones), noted poet, dramatist, essayist and political activist, is now an Assistant Professor of Africana Studies.

● Engineering Professor (and former Dean, College of Engineering and Applied Sciences) John Truxal is one of five scientists appointed to Ford Motor Co.'s Research Advisory Council. The Council will help Ford's senior management plan the direction of automotive research programs.

● Associate Professor of Sociology Mark Granovetter won a \$4,000 Faculty Development Competition offered by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation. He was awarded the grant to develop a new course, "The Relevance of Economic Theory for Sociology."

● A Diagnostic Ultrasound Service, which utilizes high frequency sound to produce images of internal organs, has been set up at the Division of Computed Tomography and Ultrasound in the School of Medicine's Department of Radiology. The state of the art equipment is expected to scan 35 to 50 patients a day for lymphomas and tumors.

● "Against Our Will: Men, Women, and the Power Paradox," a campus conference held in November, examined "power in its social, political, historical, and psychological contexts as a root cause of violence against women."

● A "Personal Computers in Education" conference was attended by 100 area school teachers and administrators in December. The meeting was sponsored by CED, Engineering and other campus departments.

● Stony Brook hosted the Long Island Regional Governor's Conference on Families, January 20. Lieutenant Governor Mario Cuomo was the keynote speaker. About 1,000 people attended the meeting and helped formulate policy recommendations on a broad range of issues affecting family life. The recommendations will be included in a State report to the National White House Conference on Families. Among numerous issues dealt with were the economy, the workplace, housing and communities, families and health, schools, culture, stress and crisis, and special needs.

ARCHIVES: ALUMNI CAN HELP

The University Archives, which are housed in the Melville Library's Department of Special Collections, recently received a phone call from Dr. Ken Scileppi, '72, now working in the New York Hospital, Cornell Medical Center. Dr. Scileppi urgently needed a copy of an article he had written for a 1972 issue of "Probe Review of Bio-Medicine," which should have been in the University Archives. Ironically, the exact issue that the article appeared in turned out to be just the one that was missing. Dr. Scileppi's request unfortunately could not be filled. However, several days later a copy of "Probe" was received by mail in the Department of Special Collections; it was just the issue that had been requested. Included was a note from Dr. Scileppi explaining that upon searching further, he had found this copy in a place he had'nt thought of earlier — his mother's attic! He decided to donate it to the Archives, thereby making it available to others for future research.

The University Archives collects papers, records, and publications documenting the history of Stony Brook since its establishment, and welcomes gifts for its growing collection.

The Mortimer Kreuter Scholarship, offered each spring and fall semester to a mature person who needs financial help to return to or continue college studies, provides \$500 toward expenses for undergraduate or graduate study. The award may be used over one or two semesters for such study-related expenses as transportation, books and supplies, and baby-sitter services. 



When the Stony Brook spring sports teams hit the field in April, they will have the added motivation of trying to equal the outstanding performances turned in by Patriot fall and winter sports squads.

Richard Crumholtz is the new Patriot baseball skipper, and after a solid season in 1979 the Patriots have set their sights on qualifying for the ECAC Baseball Playoffs in May.

Judy Christ returns to coach the women's softball team, and with a host of returning starters, they should be in for a most rewarding and productive campaign.

Men's tennis coach Les Thompson has the unenviable task of trying to replace graduated stars Steve Aronowitz and Jack Appleman. Last summer, the "A&A Boys" were selected to compete in the NCAA Division III Tennis Championships as a doubles team for the second consecutive year. Even with a 1980 schedule loaded with Division I opponents such as Army and Fairleigh Dickinson, Coach Thompson expects to have his team right at the top of the pack.

Along with the men's track and squad led by Coach George Robinson, the spring sports teams will have the amazing success of the Patriots football, soccer, volleyball, ice hockey, and basketball clubs to reflect upon in 1980.

Last fall, the football and soccer teams captured the imagination of the campus and community with superb regular season efforts that left them literally inches away from the prestigious post-season playoffs.

Under the guidance of head coach Fred Kemp, the Patriots football club finished the '79 campaign with a 7-2 record and the No. 6 ranking in the National Collegiate Football Association Poll. Interior lineman Bob Leroy and linebacker Steve Baretto were named to the All-American Team and with virtually the entire squad eligible to return next year, 1980 could be a championship season for Stony Brook Football.

New York Apollo M.V.P. Chris Tyson, in his second year as head coach of the soccer team, led the Patriot kickers to an excellent 7-4-4 record and to the co-championship of the M.I.S.C. Division II East. Tyson was named the conference Coach of the Year, and the Patriots walked away with a slew of awards in '79. Phil Lesko was selected as the conference M.V.P. and first team goalkeeper; Tim Cuasck made first team forward and Junior Price made first team defensive back; Jeff Schmidt made second team forward and Rich Campbell made second team back. Cusack finished the season as the Pats' leading goal scorer with 10 goals, and Lesko's goals-against-average was a brilliant 1.70.

Patriot ice hockey and volleyball teams raced to their best starts ever in 1979. In basketball action, both the men's and women's squads were showing strong signs of making a run for a post-season playoff berth. Basketball senior captain Mel Walker was named E.C.A.C. Player of the Week twice in December, and in the first triple overtime contest at the Stony Brook Gym in a decade, Walker scored a career-high 38 points to lead the Pats to a 96-92 triumph over SUNY Binghamton.
