Nobel Winning Chemist Speaks at Stony Brook

Nobel prize-winning atmospheric chemist Mario Molina will discuss the "Antarctic Ozone Hole" when he speaks at Stony Brook on Friday, April 25. This special, free, post-Earth Day program is sponsored by Stony Brook's Department of Earth and Planetary Sciences.

A professor at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Molina and two colleagues shared the 1995 Nobel Prize in Chemistry. The three were recognized for research that demonstrated the importance of catalytic effects arising from small concentrations of atmospheric trace gases on stratospheric ozone loss. Molina's talk begins at 4 p.m. in the Earth and Space Sciences building lecture room.






