A GOLDEN YEA



This year's main commencement ceremony, the largest on Long Island with 2,962 degree candidates, was held on Friday, May 23, in the Sports Complex Main Arena. President Kenny addressed the graduates and conferred the degrees. Among the honorable guests seated on the platform were New York State Senator John J. Flanagan, New York State Assemblyman Steven Englebright, Suffolk County Legislator Vivian Fisher, and Stony Brook Council Chair Richard T. Nasti, along with other members of the Council.

Receiving a degree this year was 14-year-old Alia Sabur, the youngest degree candidate at Stony Brook and in the SUNY system. She earned a B.S. in Applied Mathematics and Statistics, Summa Cum Laude, and is a 2003 Golden Key International Honor Society winner and clarinet prodigy, studying with the Metropolitan Opera's principal clarinetist, Ricardo Morales. She is planning to continue her studies at Stony Brook with research in protein folding, a specialized area in biophysics, with a prestigious GAANN Fellowship for Doctoral Study.

Kelly Brown, who received a B.A. in Political Science, Summa Cum Laude, and won the Student Speech Competition, was the student speaker. This year's honorary degree recipients were Robert Shaler, Director of Forensic Biology, New York City Medical Examiner's Office, who orchestrated the effort to identify human remains after September 11, and David E. Acker, scientist and inventor, Transurgical Incorporated.




School of Medicine Convocation



The School of Medicine graduated 107 students at its Convocation on Thursday, May 22, at the Staller Center. Among the new graduates were newlyweds Lauren McGowan and Scott McGovern, who were married just four days before receiving their medical degrees and left for their honeymoon after the Convocation. The couple met on the first day of medical school four years ago and began dating while attending an anatomy class together. Next month they will both start their residencies at the Mayo Clinic.

Barry Coller, M.D., an internationally recognized leader in blood research, was the Convocation speaker and also received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science. While an Assistant Professor at Stony Brook's School of Medicine in the 1980s, Dr. Coller developed ReoPro®, a pioneering drug that reduces mortality in patients with coronary artery disease. ReoPro® was the first drug ever developed by a SUNY institution that was approved for marketing by the FDA. Dr. Coller is now Vice President for Medical Affairs at Rockefeller University.

Dr. Lenora McClean Retires from SBU

Lenora J. McClean, Ed.D., R.N., who piloted Stony Brook's School of Nursing through a period of unprecedented growth and established the nursing program as an international leader in many key areas, will retire after 31 years at the University—23 of them as Dean. McClean, who has led the School of Nursing since 1980, is considered one of the country's foremost innovators in nursing education.

"Lenora McClean raised the bar in nursing education," said Norman H. Edelman, M.D., Vice President of the Health Sciences Center and Dean of the School of Medicine. "Many of her innovations, first implemented here, now are commonplace in nursing schools throughout the nation. Her contribution to nursing—and to Stony Brook—is immeasurable."

The University will pay tribute to Dean McClean's career on Thursday, June 12, at a black-tie Gala at Villa Lombardi's. The evening will also mark the kick-off of an effort to create an Endowed Chair of Nursing Research as the centerpiece of a planned doctoral program. The five-year campaign has a goal of \$1.5 million.

"Stony Brook holds many great memories for me and for what we were able to achieve in nursing," said Dean McClean, who is returning to her native Georgia. "I leave knowing that this is an exciting time for the School and that the time is right to begin planning a doctoral program that will keep Stony Brook a leader in the profession."
