Downey to Talk on Long Island's Economic Outlook in the 1990s

Congressman Thomas Downey (D-N.Y.) will speak on "Long Island's Future: The Nineties and Beyond" on Friday, Dec. 1, from 2 - 3 p.m. in the Alliance Room of the Frank Melville, Jr. Memorial Library.

Rep. Downey's visit is an informal "inauguration of President Marburger's and Provost Edelstein's initiative to put Long Island's economy on the road to the future," says Lee Koppelman, director of Stony Brook's Center for Regional Policy Studies, which is co-sponsoring the event with the Division of Social and Behavioral

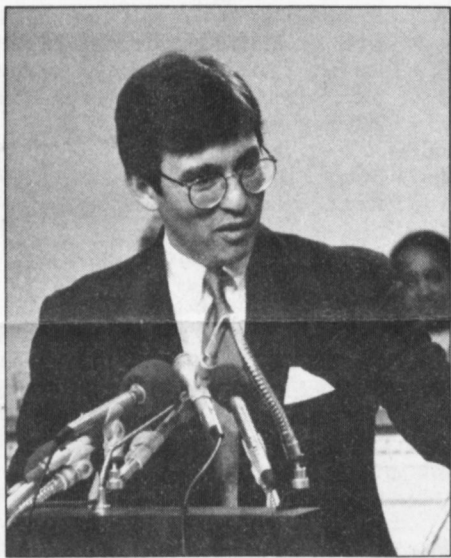
Sciences.

Rep. Downey, a seven-term House veteran and a well-known environmentalist, played a major role shaping the tax provisions needed to pay for the "beefed-up" superfund hazardous waste program. He is also known for his collaborative efforts with Rep. Patricia Schroeder (D-Colo.) to push a nuclear test ban through Congress. He has established himself as a significant force on the Ways and Means Committee, and was influential in the recent F-14D legislation.

Although a formal lecture series has yet to be established, this lecture is part of a continuing effort to stimulate interaction between Stony Brook's policy experts and state and federal policy makers. Direct involvement with business is the goal of such facilities as the Small Business Development Center and the Center for Biotechnology, but collaboration also extends to the fields of medical research, computer science and waste management, explains Andrew Policano, dean of the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences.

Funding from external sources has enabled research faculty to work with the community. The Institute for Social Analysis, for example, has been instrumental in retraining displaced Grumman employees.

Concert to Benefit Figaro and Susanna

The Stony Brook Opera Ensemble and the Center for Italian Studies are collaborating on a project so ambitious that they are sponsoring a benefit concert to help fund it. The project is a lavishly staged production of Mozart's *The Marriage of Figaro*, to be sung in Italian by graduate students March 24.

The benefit concert, Saturday, Dec. 2 at 8 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the Staller Center for the Arts, consists of an evening of operatic favorites. Guest artists Giovanni Consiglio, tenor, and Jolanta Rajewska, soprano, accompanied by pianist Albert Stanziano will be featured.

Consiglio has performed in nearly all of the major opera houses in Italy, France and Spain, and is recognized as one of the foremost interpreters of the role of Canio in *Pagliacci*, leading critics to acclaim his

"Caruso-like" voice. Rajewska recently completed a 14-concert tour of Puerto Rico that featured Spanish folk songs as well as opera. They will sing selections from Puccini's *Madama Butterfly*, Boito's *Mefistofele*, Verdi's *I Lombardi* and Giordano's *Andrea Chenier*.

The second part of the program will feature the opera ensemble performing highlights from Act II of *Figaro* with piano accompaniment. The complete opera will have a full orchestra, conducted by David Lawton, professor of music, and staging by Gary Glaze, lecturer of music. The ensemble will also perform three scenes from Rossini's *Cenerentola*, and Act III of Puccini's *La Boheme*. All of the selections will be sung in Italian.

The Center for Italian Studies is a non-profit organization based at Stony Brook dedicated to bringing authentic Italian culture to the Long Island community. It publishes a journal, *Forum Italicum*, now in its 23rd year, sponsors special events and offers non credit Italian language courses for all ages and levels.

A suggested donation of \$25 will benefit both the Center for Italian Studies and the Stony Brook Opera Ensemble. The University Art Gallery will be open before the performance, from 7 - 8 p.m., with an exhibit titled, *Fiber Explorations*, and a wine and cheese reception will follow. Staller Center Welcomes Musical Friends

When the Beaux Arts Trio debuted in 1955, maestro Arturo Toscanini commended their "impeccable taste and musicianship." He also noted, "their performance is an inspiring experience." The legendary trio returns to the Staller Center Friday, Dec. 8 at 8 p.m., for their first Stony Brook appearance since 1983.

Violinist Isidore Cohen is the only remaining original member, since cellist Bernard Greenhouse, who was professor of music at Stony Brook, announced his retirement three years ago. The new trio, consisting of Cohen, pianist Menahem Pressler and cellist Peter Wiley, has been garnering rave reviews.

Much has been made of the fact that while Cohen and Pressler have been regarded as "elder statesmen" of chamber

music, Wiley was born the year the group formed. But the Beaux Arts' rigorous performance schedule of 100 concerts a year has given the trio plenty of time to develop the special interaction that makes a trio more than just three fine musicians playing the same piece.

Despite his relative youth, Wiley's background includes master classes with Pablo Casals, and eight years as the principal cellist of the Cincinnati Symphony, a position he first held at the age of 20.

"You can only get to know a musician during a concert," said Pressler in the *New York Times*. "And I would say that Peter came through with flying colors. He played beautifully, and he really went to town. Playing with him has been a real surprise, and a pleasure."

The Dec. 8 program includes Haydn's Trio in E-flat major, Smetana's Trio in G minor, Op. 15, Copland's "Vitebsk" and Brahms' Trio in C major, Op. 87.

Theatre Students to Perform Premiere

The Department of Theatre Arts is presenting the world premiere of *The Only Song I Know*, written by assistant theatre arts professor John Cameron, in the Staller Center's Theatre II Dec. 5 - 9 at 8 p.m. with 2 p.m. matinees Dec. 9 - 10.

Cameron's play is based on one woman's life history. It confronts such issues as Alzheimer's disease, battered women and survival. Audience discussion will follow specified performances.

Since his arrival at Stony Brook in 1987, Cameron has appeared in the title role of *Tartuffe*, and has directed *Cloud Nine* and *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum*. As director of production, he instituted the Performance Workshop, a touring group of student actors.

Terri Kent Gruszewski, assistant professor of theatre arts, will direct. She also directed the 1989 Performance Workshop Summer Camp and appeared in last year's theatre arts production of *Rashomon*. She will be performing the title role in the upcoming American premiere of Tadashi Suzuki's adaptation of *Clytemnestra*.

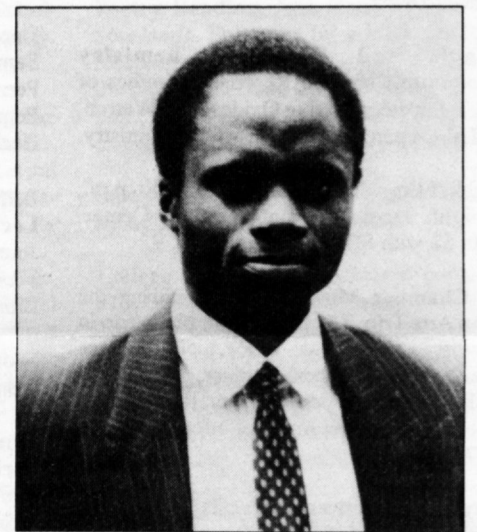
