The Main Stage Music Series opens with Trevor Pinnock and the English Concert, England's leading period chamber orchestra, on Saturday, Oct. 7; followed by *The Pirates of Penzance*, performed by the New York Gilbert & Sullivan Players, on Saturday, Nov. 11; Soviet émigré pianist Bella Davidovich on Saturday, Dec. 16; the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra on Friday, Feb. 23; and finally the Atlanta Symphony, with Yoel Levi conducting, on Saturday, April 7.

The Orion String Quartet will open the Chamber Music Series on Saturday, Oct. 28; followed by Charles Rosen, pianist, on Wednesday, Nov. 15; the Beaux Arts Trio on Friday, Dec. 8; the Aulos Ensemble, a baroque group, with soprano Julianne Baird, on Saturday, Feb. 17; and the Kronos Quartet on Friday, March 30.

Jazz concerts, presented by the International Art of Jazz, Inc., will include the Billy Taylor Trio on Saturday, Oct. 14; saxophonist/clarinetist Ken Peplowski & Friends on Saturday, Jan. 27; and the Muhal Richard Abrams Quartet on Saturday, Feb. 24.

# Film Series Involves Campus and Community


The upcoming films are:

• "*Chuquiago*" (Bolivia, 1977), directed by Antonio Eguino. Brooke Larson, associate professor of history, will speak on the significance of the film, Monday, Oct. 2.

• "Hour of the Star" (Brazil, 1985), directed by Suzana Amaral. Coco Fusco, film critic, curator and program officer with the New York Council for the Humanities, will speak on this film, which won several awards and was nominated for an Academy Award, Monday, Oct. 16.

• "Frida" (Mexico, 1984), directed by Paul Leduc. The dramatic story of a celebrated artist, political activist and feminist, Frida Kahlo, is re-enacted in this docudrama, Monday, Oct. 30.

• "Up to a Certain Point" (Cuba, 1983), directed by Tomas Gutierrez. Roman de la Campa, chair of the Department of Hispanic Languages and Literature, will discuss this slyly sardonic comedy about domestic life in Cuba, Monday, Nov. 13.

• "They Don't Wear Black Tie" (Brazil, 1981), directed by Leon Hirszman. Barbara Weinstein, associate professor of history, will speak on this family drama in which father and son fight on opposite sides of a violent strike, Monday, Nov. 27.

• "Improper Conduct" (France, 1984), written and directed by Nestor Almendros and Orlando Jimenez Leal. This documentary, featuring 28 Cuban exiles around the world, focuses on the oppressive side of the Cuban revolution, Monday, Dec. 11.

The International Art of Jazz, Inc. (IAJ), based at USB, is offering three jazz concerts at the Staller Center for the Arts this season: the Billy Taylor Trio at 8 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 14; Saxophonist/clarinetist Ken Peplowski & Friends at 8 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 27; Muhal Richard Abrams Quartet at 8 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 24.

The International Art of Jazz, Inc. is a non-profit organization devoted to furthering jazz as America's music, as a diverse and continuing art form which is a vital part of American heritage.

In addition to its Staller Center series, IAJ presents a free summer jazz festival at Heckscher State Park in Islip and community concerts in libraries, museums, hospitals, prisons and houses of worship, under the leadership of executive director Ann H. Sneed. As part of the Arts-in-Education program, the IAJ Ensemble—a quintet or sextet of musicians plus a vocalist—gives a live performance in schools, demonstrating the improvisation and spontaneity that are key elements of jazz.

Chinese Journalist Will Speak on Beijing Crisis

Xiaopo Huang, who in her role as Deputy Director of the National Press Club of the People's Republic of China is responsible for managing the media affairs of the Chinese government, will speak on Tuesday, Oct. 10 as part of the University Distinguished Lecture Series.

Her topic, "Beijing In Crisis: A Historical Perspective," will begin at 8 p.m. in the Recital Hall, Staller Center for the Arts. The program is free and open to the public.

Her experience with both the Chinese government and the foreign press gives her a unique vantage point for a discussion of the controversial government responses to student demonstrations. Considered the most authoritative speaker on the subject of contemporary China and the recent political turmoil there, she will be in the United States throughout 1989-90 as a Woodrow Wilson fellow at Princeton University.


