Stony Brook Celebrates Silver Anniversary of Student Theatre

The Department of Theatre Arts celebrates its 25th anniversary season this fall with six exciting productions that promise

to pack the Staller Center.

Continuing the tradition of innovative theatre, this season features performances that audiences are not likely to see outside of a major metropolitan area. In addition, the open audition policy will allow non-theatre arts students to get involved in the productions.

The fall season opens with Eric Overmyer's comedy *On the Verge*. Directed by Thomas Neumiller, professor of theatre arts, the show runs Oct. 19-22 in Theatre II of the Staller Center of the Arts. Performances begin at 8 p.m.; a 2 p.m. matinee is scheduled for Sunday.

Kutiyattam, an ancient Hindu dance ritual and the world's oldest living art form, will be presented Nov. 16-19 and Nov. 30-Dec. 2 in Theatre I of the Staller Center. Under the direction of guest artists from India, students will convey stories of demon kings, seductive beauties, monkey generals, warriors and clowns, without words. Performances begin at 8 p.m.; a 2 p.m. matinee is scheduled for the Sunday performance.

On Dec. 5-10, the world premiere of

theatre arts professor John Cameron's *The Only Song I Know* will be performed. Directed by theatre arts assistant professor Terri Gruszewski, this chilling drama explores the heart and mind of a battered woman. Performances begin at 8 p.m. in Theatre II; 2 p.m. matinees are scheduled for the Saturday and Sunday shows.

The spring season opens with Sam Shepard's *Curse of the Starving Class* Feb. 22-25 and March 1-4 in Theatre I. This production will be directed by Farley Richmond, chair of the Department of Theatre Arts.

The American premiere of Tadashi

Suzuki's adaptation of *Clytemnestra* will be performed March 22-25, 29-31 in Theatre I. Yukihiro Goto, assistant professor of theatre arts, will direct this production.

The season will close with William Shakespeare's *Taming of the Shrew*. Directed by theatre arts professor William Bruehl, the play will be shown May 2-6 on the Main Stage of the Staller Center for the Arts.

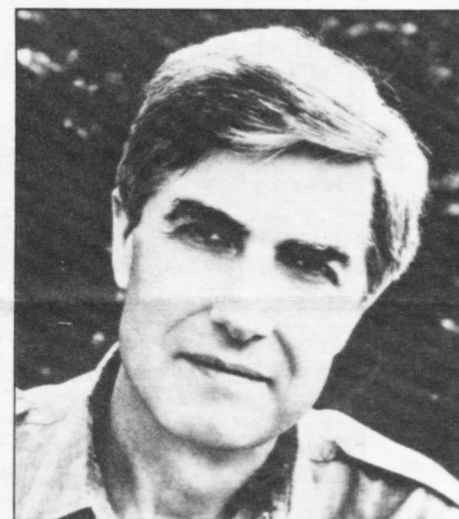
Famed Journalist Recounts Vietnam

One of the nation's foremost journalists, Pulitzer Prize-winner Neil Sheehan, will reflect on the war in Vietnam when he speaks Tuesday, Oct. 24 as part of USB's Distinguished Lecture Series.

His talk, "Vietnam: How Could This War Have Happened?" begins at 8 p.m. on the Main Stage of the Staller Center for the Arts. Co-sponsored by the Office of the Provost and *Newsday*, the series is free and open to the public.

United Press International's Vietnam bureau chief from 1962 to 1964 and the man responsible for obtaining the Pentagon Papers for the *New York Times*, Sheehan went on to author the much-heralded best seller, *A Bright Shining Lie: John Paul Vann and America in Vietnam*, a powerful blend of history and biography that provides a sweeping view of the war through the exploits of one man.

Other speaker in the 1989-90 Distinguished Lecture Series will include lawyer, politician and educator Sarah Weddington on Nov. 21; author Mark Mathabane, Feb. 6; Tony Award-winning

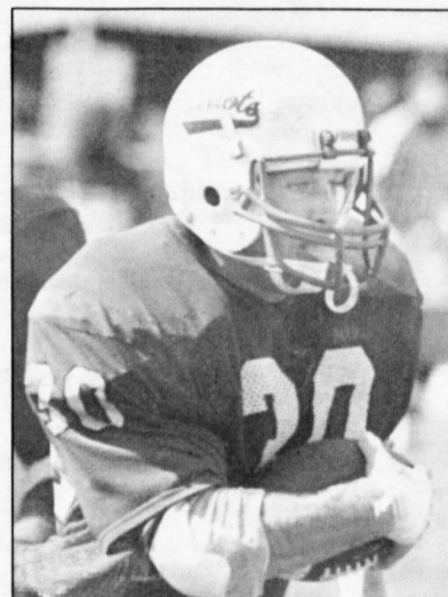

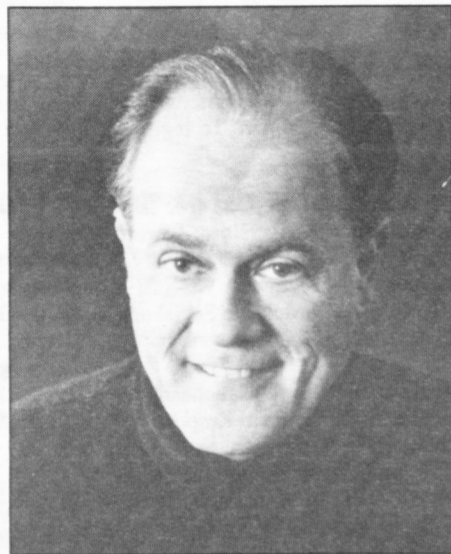
