





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### **Taxonomy: Publicity**



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
The measures, process or business of securing public notice. Information designed to enhance the image of a person, product or organization.

### Taxonomy: Propaganda



Information, ideas or rumors deliberately spread widely to help or harm a person, group, movement, Institution or nation. It is often biased or misleading, in order to promote an ideology or political point of view.

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### **Taxonomy: Entertainment**



Something affording pleasure, diversion, or amusement, often a performance of some kind.





Information that has yet to be examined or verified. It is unfiltered information that bypasses traditional gatekeepers and mediators.

### What is News?

Information of some public interest that is shared and subject to a journalistic process of <u>verification</u>, and for which an <u>independent</u> individual or organization is directly <u>accountable</u>.

### So Who is a Journalist?

- Primary Mission is to Inform the Public
- Employs Journalistic Methods and Values

### So Who is a Journalist?

- Subjects work to verification
- Makes a conscious effort to maintain independence
- Accountable: Stands behind work

# What Makes News Different?


