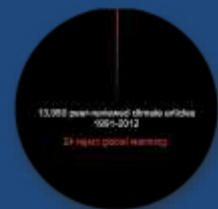
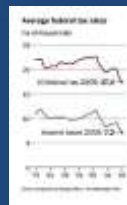

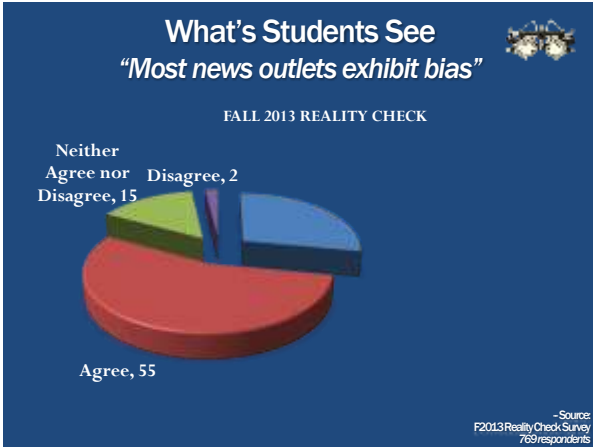
## What the Public Sees

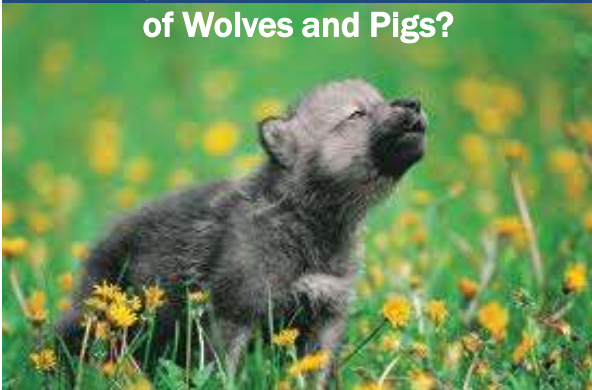

## Key Definitions

Main Entry: **balance**   
 Pronunciation: /ˈbæl(ə)ns/  
 Function: noun  
 Etymology: Middle English, from Anglo-French, from Vulgar Latin \**bālancā*, from Late Latin *bālanca*, *bālancā* having two scales/pans, from Latin *bā-* + *lancā*, *lancā* plate  
 Date: 13th century

**Balance: Equality between the totals of the two (or more) sides of the account. Balance is more technical; a quantitative measurement.**

## What Is Balance?

### Obama, congressional leaders still deadlocked on shutdown

11/15/2013 - President Barack Obama met with Republican and Democratic leaders in Congress on Wednesday to try to break a deadlock that has shut the federal government since Sept. 16.

After more than an hour of talks, House of Representatives Speaker John Boehner said Obama refused to negotiate, while House Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi and Senate Democratic Leader Harry Reid accused Republicans of trying to hold the president hostage over Obamacare.

Boehner said Obama would not negotiate with the House of Representatives and the Senate until the president agreed to a deal that would allow the federal government to continue to operate without any funding from the House of Representatives.

Reid said Democrats were willing to discuss any ways to tackle the budget after a temporary funding bill is passed. "We're through playing these little games," he said.

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"The president reiterated one more time that he will not negotiate," Boehner told reporters after the White House meeting. "All we're asking for here is a discussion and fairness for the American people under Obamacare."

## Is Balance the Same as Fairness?



### Headline Statements from the Summary for Policymakers

Warming of the climate system is unequivocal, and since the 1950s, many of the observed changes are unprecedented over decades to millennia. The atmosphere and ocean have warmed, the amounts of snow and ice have diminished, sea level has risen, and the concentrations of greenhouse gases have increased.

Each of the last three decades has been successively warmer at the Earth's surface than any preceding decade since 1850. In the Northern Hemisphere, 1983–2012 was the warmest 30-year period of the last 1400 years.

Green warming dominates the increase in energy stored in the climate system, accounting for more than 90% of the energy accumulated between 1971 and 2010 (high confidence). It is virtually certain that the upper ocean (0–700 m) warmed from 1971 to 2010, and it likely warmed between the 1870s and 1971.

Over the last two decades, the Greenland and Arctic ice sheets have been losing mass, glaciers have continued to shrink almost worldwide, and Arctic sea ice and Northern Hemisphere spring snow cover have continued to decrease in extent (high confidence).

## What is Bias?

Main Entry: **bias**   
 Pronunciation: \ˈbi-əs\  
 Function: *noun*  
 Etymology: Middle French *biais*  
 Date: 1530

**Bias: A predisposition that distorts your ability to fairly weigh the evidence and prevents you from reaching a fair or accurate judgment.**

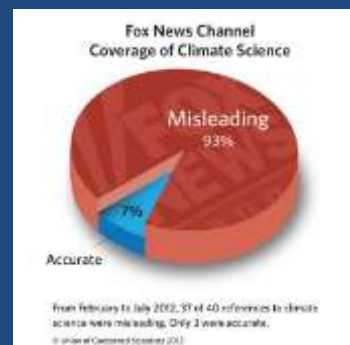
## How to Spot Bias

- Look for evidence of a pattern of unfairness over time
- Compare a variety of news outlets especially to search for a bias by omission
- Take note of the self-interest of those alleging bias

## The News Literacy Definition:

**Bias:**  
 a pattern of unfairness

## Bias is a *Pattern*



### Common Flaws in "Bias" Claims:

**"The news media is biased."**  
 (Generalizations are, generally, unprovable.☹)

**"Editorials determine the angle taken by print reporters."**

(Reporting routinely contradicts editorial page assertions.)

**"TV reporters follow the lead of the talk show hosts on their network."**

(Reporting routinely contradicts talk show assertions.)

Obama's War Against Fox News



"What I think is fair to say about Fox — and certainly it's the opposite here — is that it really is more a wing of the Republican Party," said Anita Liman, White House communications director, on CNN.

"It's astounding the White House cannot distinguish between news and opinion programming," Clemente said. "It seems self-serving on their part."

As for Dune's complaint about Fox News' coverage of the Obama campaign, a study by the Pew Research Center showed that 40 percent of Fox News stories on Obama in the last six weeks of the campaign were negative. Similarly, 40 percent of Fox News' stories on Obama's Republican opponent, Sen. John McCain, were negative.

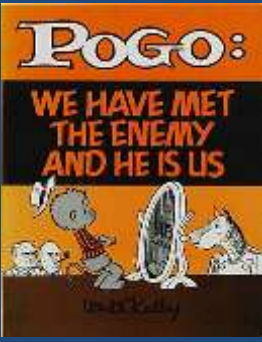

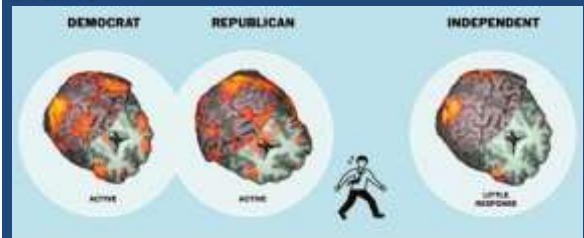

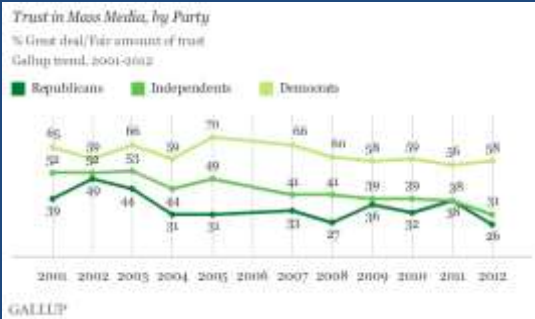
## “Hostile Media Effect”



The War In Lebanon, 1982

- A belief among partisans that news reports are painting them in the worst possible light.
- People who are deeply involved in one side of an issue or another are quicker to spot and remember aspects of a news story that are negative.
- The best-informed partisans are the most likely to see bias.

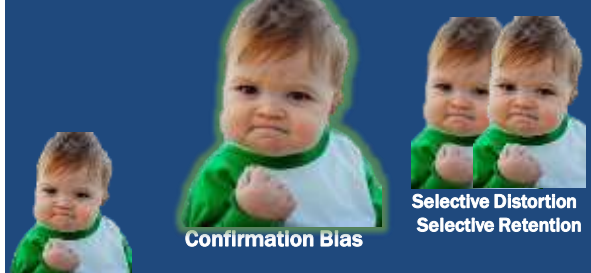

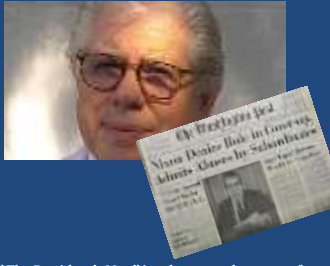
